

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Introduction

Culture & Diversity Definitions

Culture refers to a group or community which shares common experiences that shape the way its members understand the world. (University of Kansas, 2014) **Culture** can be along the dimensions of race, ethnicity, socio-economic status, age, physical and mental abilities, religious beliefs, political beliefs, or other ideologies.

Diversity is a reality created by individuals and groups from a broad spectrum of demographic and philosophical differences. These include but are not limited to age, ethnicity, class, physical and mental abilities/qualities, race, as well as religious status, educational background, geographical location, income, marital status, parental status, and work experiences. (Queensborough Community College, 2020)

The term “**culturally diverse**” is often used interchangeably with the concept of “multiculturalism.” Multiculturalism is defined as:

*“...a system of beliefs and behaviors that **recognizes and respects** the presence of all diverse groups in an organization or society, **acknowledges and values** their socio-cultural differences, and **encourages** and enables their continued contribution within an inclusive cultural context which **empowers** all within the organization or society.* (Purdue University, 2020)


Sociologist Dr. Caleb Rosado, who specializes in diversity and multiculturalism, described seven important actions involved in the definition of multiculturalism:

- **Recognition** of the abundant diversity of cultures.
- **Respect** for the differences.
- **Acknowledging** the validity of different cultural expressions and contributions.
- **Valuing** what other cultures offer.
- **Encouraging** the contribution of diverse groups.
- **Empowering** people to strengthen themselves and others to achieve their maximum potential by being critical of their own biases; and
- **Celebrating** rather than just tolerating the differences to bring about unity through diversity.


Membership Demographics

Ethnicity Percentage of Membership Across Canada





Ethnicity Percentage of Executive




Percentage of members under 35

Calendar of Canadian Multicultural Celebrations

This list is intended to be used by parish councils as a resource to learn more about the many celebrations that are celebrated by Canadians. It was compiled by the encourage diversity working group as one way to meet the strategy G3.A2: Embrace diverse cultures and ages from *The Catholic Women's League of Canada Plans Strategically* document.

This is not an exhaustive list but serves as a starting point for League members and councils that wish to learn more about the many cultures that are represented in Canada and in the League.

MONTH	NAME	BRIEF DESCRIPTION
	Treaty Days	Celebrates the days treaties were signed by the federal government and Indigenous peoples between the 18 th and 20 th centuries. It also promotes public awareness about Indigenous cultures, history and heritage. Regions and provinces of Canada celebrate various treaties on different days of the year.
	Other	Diocesan councils with larger cities have more multicultural groups and may need to add relevant multicultural events to this list. Caribbean and African festivals (i.e. Caribbean Carabana Festival (Toronto), Cariwest Festival (Edmonton), Festival International Nuits d'Afrique (Montreal), African Festival of Arts and Culture (Halifax))
January	Robbie Burns Day	The celebration of the life and poetry of the Scottish poet Robert Burns on the poet's birthday (January 25 th), known as Robbie Burns Day.
January/February	Chinese New Year	Also known as the Spring Festival or the Lunar New Year.
January 3 rd Sunday	World Religion Day	Observed in more than 80 countries, the aim is to foster interfaith understanding, and harmony by emphasizing the common elements underlying all religions.
February	Black History Month	Canadians celebrate the achievements and contributions of Black Canadians of African descent who have helped shape Canada and whose presence in Canada dates back to the early 1600s.

MONTH	NAME	BRIEF DESCRIPTION
February 3 rd Monday	Heritage Day (Family Day, Louis Riel Day, Nova Scotia Heritage Day, Islander Day)	<p>“Canadian holiday celebrating the country’s history and architecture. Heritage Day is not an official national holiday, though it is widely recognized throughout Canada. For most of Canada’s provinces, Heritage Day is celebrated on the third Monday in February, however, there are some notable exceptions: in Alberta, it occurs on the first Monday of August; in Yukon, the Friday before the last Sunday in February; and in Saskatchewan, February 17.” (britannica.com/topic/Heritage-Day-Canadian-holiday)</p> <p>“In Canada more generally, the third Monday in February has also been celebrated as Heritage Day, though is not as an official holiday. This “Heritage Day” is observed by some in celebration of the country’s collective history, architecture, and cultural heritage.”...“The third Monday of February is observed as “Family Day” in the provinces of British Columbia (BC), Alberta, Ontario, New Brunswick and Saskatchewan; as Louis Riel Day in Manitoba; as Nova Scotia Heritage Day in Nova Scotia; and as Islander Day in Prince Edward Island.” (en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Family_Day_(Canada))</p>
February Last Wednesday	Anti-Bullying Day/ Pink Shirt Day	Canadians stand together with each other and the world by wearing pink in a display against bullying.
March 1 st Friday	World Day of Prayer	An international ecumenical Christian lay women’s initiative celebrated in more than 170 countries. “The World Day of Prayer is traditionally celebrated on the first Friday of March, though communities can choose other dates.” (wicc.org/world-day-of-prayer/what-is-wdp/)
March 17 th	St. Patrick’s Day	A religious celebration in the 17 th century to commemorate the life of St. Patrick and the arrival of Christianity in Ireland which is celebrated on the anniversary of his death (March 17 th)
March 21 st	International Day for the Elimination of Racial Discrimination	“The International Day for the Elimination of Racial Discrimination is observed annually on the day the police in Sharpeville, South Africa, opened fire and killed 69 people at a peaceful demonstration against apartheid ‘pass laws’ in 1960.” (un.org/en/observances/end-racism-day)

MONTH	NAME	BRIEF DESCRIPTION
May	Asian Heritage Month	Canadians with Asian roots celebrate and educate through month-long events. “May is Asian Heritage Month in Canada, a time to reflect on and celebrate the contributions that Canadians of Asian descent have made and continue to make, to the growth and prosperity of Canada. Asian Heritage Month has been celebrated across Canada since the 1990s. In December 2001, the Senate of Canada adopted a motion proposed by Senator Vivienne Poy to officially designate May as Asian Heritage Month in Canada. In May 2002, the Government of Canada signed an official declaration to designate May as Asian Heritage Month.” (canada.ca/en/canadian-heritage/campaigns/asian-heritage-month/about.html)
May 13 th	WUCWO Day	World Union of Catholic Women’s Organisations (wucwo.org/index.php/en/prayers/wucwo-annual-day-of-prayer)
June	Filipino Heritage Month	Canadian Filipinos celebrate and share their culture through month-long festivities throughout Canada.
June 21 st	National Indigenous Peoples Day	A day for all Canadians to recognize and celebrate the unique heritage, diverse cultures and outstanding contributions of First Nations, Inuit and Metis peoples.
June 27 th	Multiculturalism Day	Canada celebrates its numerous cultural communities and the values that Canadians share such as, freedom, democracy, individual rights, and the rule of law. (canada.ca/en/canadian-heritage/campaigns/multiculturalism-day.html)
July 1 st	Canada Day	Canadians across the country and around the world show pride in their history, culture and achievements.
September 21 st	National Day of Prayer for Christians in the Holy Land	Organized by The Catholic Women’s League of Canada under the work of the Catholic Near-East Welfare Association.
September 30 th	National Day for Truth and Reconciliation	“The new national day will honour survivors, their families and communities. It will also ensure that public commemoration of the tragic and painful history and legacy of residential schools remains a vital component of the reconciliation process.” (canada.ca/en/canadian-heritage/news/2020/09/government-of-canada-introduces-legislation-to-establish-national-day-for-truth-and-reconciliation.html)

MONTH	NAME	BRIEF DESCRIPTION
October 4 th	National day of Action for Missing Indigenous Women and Girls	A day to remember the: “...persistent and deliberate human and Indigenous rights violations and abuses are the root cause behind Canada’s staggering rates of violence against Indigenous women, girls...” (mmiwg-ffada.ca/wp-content/uploads/2019/06/News-Release-Final-Report.pdf)
November 25 th	International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women	The first day of a 16-day campaign of activism against gender-based violence that ends on Human Rights Day (December 10th).
December 6 th	St. Nicholas Day	Celebrated in Austria, Belgium, Netherlands, and Eastern Europe. “St. Nicholas is the patron saint of Russia and Greece, of a number of cities, and of sailors and children, among many other groups, and was noted for his generosity.” (britannica.com/topic/Saint-Nicholas-Day)

Summary

In order to experience real, lasting change so the League becomes as diverse as our parishes there needs to be a continued effort that lasts long after this group disbands; it needs to be a consistent long-lasting priority. There is a hope that the League will keep using images of cultural and generationally diverse women in advertising wherever possible.
